I learned it was up to me to make my new life custom of my own making.

I was waiting for the world to change; to accommodate me. However, I learned that change was up to me. Since then, opportunities never cease to appear and they never cease to amaze me. One of these opportunities was ACCESS to Independence, where I became a disability advocate. I made it my mission to encourage others to customize their life according to their own desires.

I have a BS in Rehabilitation Psychology from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. I work and volunteer in vocational rehabilitation, the Student to Transition to Employment Program (STEP), independent living and disability advocacy and support. I live in Madison, where I enjoy my family, photography, writing and making a difference whenever it shows up.

TOD: How and when did you become connected with ACCESS?

CS: When I was introduced to disability, I didn't know what to do or where to go for help. I really felt my life was over. Then someone told

me about ACCESS and I made an appointment to learn about what they do to help people with disabilities. I was given resources that made a great difference, not only in support, but they made a difference in my own personal direction. It was then that I decided to go back to school for my degree in Rehabilitation Psychology.

During that time there were opportunities to do internships and ACCESS was one of them. I learned more about the center, what they do and the amazing people who work to make the differences I found. I was hooked and became a member of the Board of Directors on and off for 8 years. It was an honor to assist in the direction and growth of ACCESS.

As a photographer, I volunteered to take photos of various events. One of my favorites was taking photos of Dee in a brat costume during the annual brat sale. I volunteered to photograph the Independent Living Days and have for the last 5 years. I've photographed ACCESS's Open Houses, meetings with Legislators as well as the Disability Pride Fest. I've been greatly touched and honored to document and witness the power and dedication of those involved in every event.

TOD: What was the most rewarding

part of your involvement with the Artists Beyond Boundaries Event?
