In our April 2022 edition of The Open Door, we announced our new menu of Accessibility Services that are available to businesses, organizations, community groups, and governments to ensure accessibility and inclusion of people with disabilities. Removing barriers creates access, which increases participation and customers. No business, program, or event should want to exclude people, and that is why Access to Independence is proud to use its expertise to help entities address those barriers through consultation and technical assistance services.

One of the ways that the work of our Accessibility Services Program is being felt in our region, is through a partnership with the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra (WCO). Access to Independence

is providing its event consultation and technical assistance services to support the accessibility and inclusion of the Concerts on the Square. This weekly summer tradition of nearly 40 years brings 50,000 people to the Capitol Square every Wednesday evening for six weeks.

The WCO has made accessibility and disability inclusion a part of their organization's broader equity and inclusion efforts, and recognized the expertise that Access to Independence brings as a partner in this work.

Clarity XLCgo Phone Amplified Handset

Access to Independence has several options for Assistive Technology that can help you hear while using your cell phone or landline phone. One option is The Clarity XLCgo phone amplified handset. This handset connects to your cell phone via Bluetooth or the XLC expandable family of land line phones. It has 50 dB amplification, tone control, volume control, extra-loud speakerphone, and a boost button with a simple design. The handset is rechargeable with USB-C charging port, is hearing-aid compatible, and has a T-Coil audio mode.

BEFORE YOU GO TO THE POLLS

#1: Register to Vote

Register to vote or be prepared to register at the polls. Call your local clerk and find out what you need to register before, or on, election day.

#2: Do Your Homework

Know where the candidates stand on the issues that are important to you. Here are some resources:

- Learn about who is on your ballot. You can do that by going to the MyVote Wisconsin website: myvote.wi.gov/en-us/Whats-On-My-Ballot
- Find your polling place, and learn how accessible it is: myvote.wi.gov/en-us/My-Municipal-Clerk

The Accessibility Services team at Access to Independence began consulting the WCO on this major event, well before the first concert on June 29th. The consultation included a review of how people connect to the event through the WCO website and emails, and provided recommendations to address barriers, as well as best practices for inclusion. The team then focused on the events themselves and conducted an evaluation at one of the weekly events this summer. That evaluation reviewed several aspects of the event from paths of travel, amenities, communication, and seating, among others. The review not only looked for barriers as determined by guidance from the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), but also determined where best practices may be implemented.

At the time this article was written, the consultation project is ongoing. In addition to recommendations, Access to Independence will provide additional technical assistance with implementing recommendations the WCO pursues.

FUNDING INDEPENDENCE

WisLoan and Telework are alternative loan programs that assist Wisconsin residents with disabilities to enable people to become self-employed or to work from home. These loan programs are different that traditional bank loans because a bank doesn't make the final decision, the WisLoan and Telework Board does. That allows flexibility for people who have an item they need to maintain their independence, but have trouble coming up with the money all at once or finding other ways to pay for what they need. WISLOAN

What Can I Buy with a WisLoan?

You can purchase technology such as wheelchairs, computers, ramps, vehicle modifications, or home modifications.

TELEWORK

What Can I Buy with a TeleWork Loan?

You can purchase items such as computers and software, scanners or fax machines, tools, office furniture, or modifications for an accessible office.

GENERAL QUESTIONS

How much can I borrow?

Loan amount range from \$250 to \$50,000. The loan would be for the exact amount of the item.

Can I apply if I have no job?

Yes. Social Security
Disability or Retirement
benefits and other sources
of income are considered.

Can I apply if my credit is poor?

Yes. The reason for the poor credit is considered, as is one's ability to repay the loan.

How do I apply?

Contact ACCESS to complete the loan application materials in person. Application can be done at the ACCESS office or at a location of your preference.
